Brief description: Stained glass 3 panel light. Shows large crown surmounting shield of arms with quartered fleur-de-lys and lions, supported with two heraldic antelope. Designed by William Miller, in 1843.

Arms of Henry VI and Margaret of Anjou. Shows large crown surmounting shield of arms with quartered fleur-de-lys and lions, supported with two heraldic antelope. This glass was for some time thought to be the work of heraldic scholar, designer and stained-glass artist Thomas Willement. However, records show it was made by glazier William Miller, who may have worked with Willement. This window combines traditional glass-painting techniques with those of enamel painting, used here to paint the jewels decorating the crown.
