



The Arms of Queen Margaret of Anjou

Brief description: A stained glass light depicting crown surmounting eight quarterings, on left arm of England and France, right fleur-de-lys, fish and cross pattern, supported by heraldic antelope and eagle.

The shield of arms is supported by an eagle and an heraldic antelope. It is a faithful copy of a 15th-century armorial in the great hall at Ockwells in Berkshire. This glass was for some time thought to be the work of heraldic scholar, designer and stained-glass artist Thomas Willement. However, records show it was made by glazier William Miller, who may have worked with Willement. This window combines traditional glass-painting techniques with those of enamel painting, used here to paint the jewels decorating the crown.
